Note from Pastor...

A Season of Renewal and Hope

April already? A quarter of the new year has passed. We have moved more than halfway through the liturgical season of Lent and are setting our sights on Easter. In nature, we have passed the seasonal solstice. The darkness and cold of winter is ending. We encounter the hope of spring with its longer days and the earth striving to enter into the promised warmth of the coming season. There is a transitional struggle in our world that is felt in our very spirits as darkness is subdued by light, cold gives way to warmth, and what seemed to be dead displays its resurrection. The Last Supper

Matthew 26:17-30, Mark 14:12-25, Luke 22:7-23

The story of the Last Supper is an invitation from Jesus to partake of Him, first to His apostles and to all Christians. This is a summary of the Last Supper Bible story as told in the books of Matthew, Mark, and Luke below. Read more in-depth Bible verses from the Scripture below and use the articles and videos to understand the meaning behind this teachable event in the Bible.

The last supper occurred on Passover's first day, or the Festival of Unleavened Bread. Jesus sent his disciples to the city to prepare a meal to celebrate Passover. Passover is the remembrance of Israel being freed from slavery to Egypt, specifically when the angel of death passed over the homes of the Israelites that had lambs' blood over the doors.

As the disciples reclined and ate dinner with Jesus, he explained that one of the twelve would soon betray him. One by one the disciplines denied that it would be them, including Judas who would be the betrayer. Jesus responded that the person who betrays him will have a terrible fate and that it was Judas.

Jesus prayed and thanked God for the meal. He then broke the bread, shared the wine with the disciples, and explained to them how the bread was a symbol of his body, broken for them, and the wine a symbol of his blood which would be poured out for their sins to be forgiven. This is where the church's tradition of communion comes from. Fish boxes are a longstanding tradition of One Great Hour of Sharing. It's a great way to involve and teach children in your congregation about giving.
