Online giving is a safe and secure way to make your donations to KPC. It is one way you can give your Sunday offering when you are not able to attend worship services. You can also set up recurring gifts. There are several ways you can give to KPC online and help support our church!

Donating through the Church Website

You can donate directly to the church from the home page of the church website. At the bottom of our home page www.kanapaha.net is a yellow donate button. Upon clicking the button you will be able to enter the amount to be donated. You will then be given the option to donate using a credit or debit card, or using your PayPal account. You will also be offered the option to provide contact information or set up recurring donations.

eBay for Charity

KPC is a registered charity with eBay for Charity. eBay customers can support the church by adding a donation when they buy an item, or donating a percentage when they sell an item. When selling an item simply pick KPC as the charity and the donation percentage (10-100%). eBay waives the same percent in fees. When the item sells, the donation is automatically sent and you get a donation receipt.

Kickin' Collard Greens

Prep Time: 10 min Serves: 6 Cook Time: 1 hr

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 3 slices bacon
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 pound fresh collard greens, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 3 cups chicken broth
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pinch red pepper flakes

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Heat oil in a large pot over medium-high heat. Add bacon, and cook until crisp, 5 to 7 minutes. Remove bacon from pan, crumble, and return to the pan.
- Add onion to the pan and cook until tender, about 5 minutes. Add garlic, and cook until just fragrant. Add collard greens, and fry until they start to wilt.
- Pour in chicken broth and season with salt, pepper, and red pepper flakes. Reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer until greens are tender, about 45 minutes.

Roasted Pork Loin

Prep Time: 20 min Cook Time: 1 hr 30 min

Serves: 8

INGREDIENTS:

- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tablespoon dried rosemary
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 pounds boneless pork loin roast
- ½ cup olive oil
- ½ cup white wine

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- Crush garlic with rosemary, salt and pepper in a mortar and pestle to make a paste. Pierce meat with a sharp knife in several places and press garlic paste into the openings. Rub pork loin with the remaining garlic mixture and olive oil. Set into an oven-safe pan.
- Place pork loin into the preheated oven, turning and basting with pan liquids every 30 minutes. Cook until the pork is no longer pink in the center, 90 minutes to 2 hours. An instantread thermometer inserted into the center should read 145 degrees F (63 degrees C). Remove roast to a platter and keep
- Place pan onto the stove over medium-high heat and pour wine into it. Heat wine and stir to loosen browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Simmer for 3 to 5 minutes
- Slice pork loin and serve with pan juices.

Blck Eyed Pea Cornbread

Prep Time: 15 min

Cook Time: 1 hr 5 min Serves: 12

INGREDIENTS:

- cooking spray
- 1 pound bulk spicy breakfast sausage
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 cup white cornmeal
- ½ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup buttermilk

- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 (15 ounce) can black-eyed peas, drained
- 1 (8 ounce) package shredded Cheddar cheese
- 3/4 cup cream-style corn
- 1 (4.5 ounce) can chopped green chile peppers
- ½ cup chopped pickled jalapeño peppers

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9x13-in. baking dish with cooking spray.
- Cook sausage and onion in a large skillet over medium heat, stirring until sausage is crumbly and no longer pink, about 5 minutes. Drain on paper towels.
- Mix cornmeal, flour, salt, and baking soda together in a large 3.
- Whisk buttermilk, oil, and eggs together in a small bowl. Add to cornmeal mixture, stirring just until moistened. Stir in sausage mixture, black-eved peas, Cheddar cheese, corn, chile peppers, and jalapeños. Pour batter into the prepared baking dish.
 - Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into center comes out clean, about 1 hour.

Hot Fudge Cheesecake Bars

Prep Time: 10 min Serves: 12 Total Time: 4 hrs

INGREDIENTS:

FOR THE CRUST

- 24 Oreos, crushed
- 6 tbsp. butter, melted
- Pinch of kosher salt

FOR THE CHEESECAKE

- 2 (8-oz) cream cheese bars, softened
- 1/2 c. granulated sugar
- 1/4 c. light brown sugar
- 1/4 c. cocoa powder
- 2 eggs

DIRECTIONS:

- for garnish Make crust: Preheat oven to 325° and grease an 8"-x-8" pan with cooking spray. In a medium bowl, mix crushed Oreos, butter, and salt until combined. Press tightly into prepared pan.
- Make cheesecake: In a large bowl, beat together cream cheese, granulated sugar, light brown sugar, and cocoa powder. Add eggs one at a time, then add vanilla and salt and beat until combined. Fold in hot fudge sauce. Pour mixture over crust.
- Bake until only slightly jiggly, about 40 minutes. Let cool slightly, then refrigerate until firm, 3 hours, or up to overnight.
- Drizzle with more hot fudge and sprinkle with Oreos. Slice into bars and serve.



New Year Fun Facts >>>

- 1. The song traditionally sung on New Year's, "Auld Lang Syne," means "times gone by".
- 2. Black eyed peas, ham, and cabbage are considered good luck if you eat them on New Year's Eve or Day because it is believed they will bring you money.
- **3.** Lobster and chicken are considered bad luck because lobsters can move backward and chickens can scratch in reverse, so it is thought these foods could bring a reversal of fortune.
- 4. In Italy, people wear red underwear on New Year's Day to bring good luck all year long. The tradition dates back to medieval times
- **5.** Time Square New Year's Eve Ball was first dropped in 1907 after there was a fireworks ban. The original ball weighed 700 pounds and featured 100 25-watt bulbs. Much different to the ball we know today!
- **6.** The earliest known New Year celebrations were in Mesopotamia and date back to 2000 B.C.
- 7. January is named after Janus, the god with two faces, one looking forward and one looking backward. He is the god of beginnings, transitions, gates, doors, passages, and endings.
- **8.** Ancient Persians gave New Year's gifts of eggs, which symbolised productiveness.
- 9. The first recorded New Year's celebration dates back 4,000 years to Babylon, when the first moon after the spring equinox marked a new year. In 46 B.C., Julius Caesar created a calendar with Jan. 1 as the first day of the year, partly to honour Janus, the month's namesake.
- 10. The tradition to kiss at midnight isn't a recent invention. According to old English and German folklore, the first person you come across in the new year could set the tone for the next 12 months.
- **11.** To ensure a year of good luck, firecrackers and noisemakers became tradition in order to scare away any remaining evil spirits and to ensure a brand new start.
- **12.** 2,000 pounds (907kg) of confetti are dropped on the crowd in Times Square at midnight.






